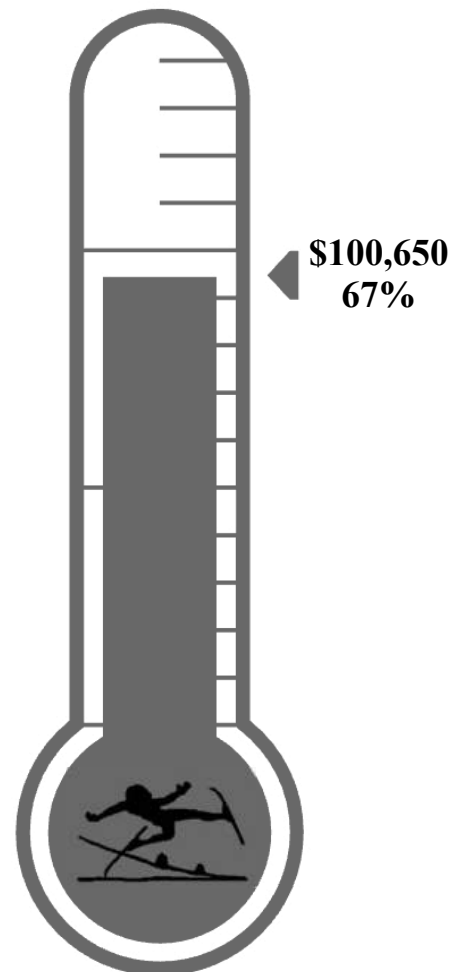

Capital Campaign / Legacy Fund

Our venerable club was founded in 1931 by seventeen intrepid skiers who went on to create what we now know as the US Ski Team, the Ski Patrol, and of course Mad River Glen. In 1957 the club would go on to raise funds to build a lodge at the base of Mad River. Today, the club's youngest skiers are born more than 100 years after the club's founders, yet are getting the same joy, the same sense of adventure that early bunch got from skiing. As we approach the club's centennial, it is time for us to come together and take on another ambitious project that honors the legacy of our founding members and secures the future of our club for today's youngest members and beyond.

Over the past several decades we have had to make numerous investments from rebuilding our website to installing a new roof, installing new water heaters, and more recently remodeling the bathrooms. Each time we undertook one of these projects it was in reaction to a problem that required immediate attention, and we funded the projects from our limited operating budget, loans from our members, and/or gifts from generous club members. Over the next few years, we will continue to make more investments in our club and our lodge. Most immediately we need to upgrade our fireplace (see nearby update). We believe there is a better more sustainable model for funding major projects that will allow us to become more front-footed and strategic in our thinking and planning for the future of the club.

The ASCNY Board of Governors has launched a campaign designed to create a sustainable Legacy Fund that will secure the future of our club and allow us to strategically plan future projects. The Legacy Fund is designed with a governance structure that ensures funds are used on strategic improvements that sustain our club and lodge. Our goal is to raise \$150,000 in 2025 and we are off to an encouraging start. To get through the finish line we will need everyone's help, big or small. Fireplace Update

We are happy to report that our fireplace committee, appointed by our board this past March, has been hard at work resolving to bring back a fully certified, fully functioning, atmosphere-creating fireplace to our lodge by the next ski season. Hooray! While the candelabra has been an attractive place holder, it obviously does not meet the needs of our members who simply want to collapse on the sofa and be warmed by a roaring fire after a chilly day on the hill (or a long drive from the city). The fireplace committee, chaired by **Molly Ladd**, and staffed by **Brooks Ware**, **Ann Gervase**, **David Clark**, **Colton Brown**, and **Haven Ladd**, understand this and are actively exploring the feasibility of reestablishing a real wood-burning fireplace as priority number one at the lodge. They will consider other options, including a fireplace insert or a wood stove, only if they cannot design, build, or fund a wood-burning fireplace.

A little history and how we got here:

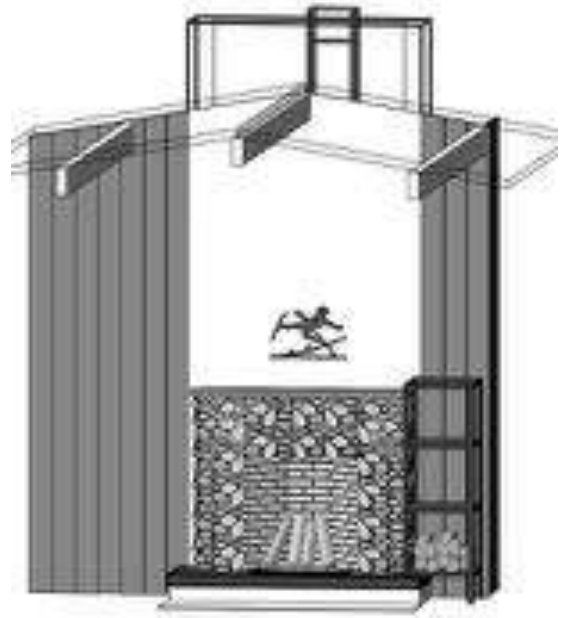
The original fireplace was built with the lodge in 1958 and was designed by **Sandy McIlvanie**. Sandy designed the open-sided fireplace with prominent black smoke hood and lodge in the Chalet-style for which he became modestly famous. He later designed the Basebox, Starks Nest, Stratton Mountain base lodge, Squaw Valley's lodge, and many private homes including Hillwood, the Washington, D.C., home of **Marjorie Merriweather Post**, which was subsequently converted into a museum.

The club has maintained the fireplace well over the years, repointing as necessary and cleaning and inspecting the chimney annually as required by our insurance company. Unfortunately, over the last several years, Vermont has seen a significant tightening of standards around fireplaces and chimney inspectors because of a well-publicized fire at the Sugarbush resort in 2014. In the fall of 2023, just before the '24 ski season, the remaining two chimney inspectors who certify commercial fireplaces refused to certify our chimney and fireplace. Since that time, we have been unable to use our fireplace as doing so would jeopardize the insurance on the lodge and risk shutting down the whole operation.

Fireplace Update

Here is a summary of some of the issues we are facing:

- The chimney inspectors' primary issue with our chimney is that the path of smoke takes a 90 degree turn behind the smoke hood prior to turning vertically into the chimney. This is a clear no-no under the current code for wood-burning fireplaces (not in the code in 1958 when the fireplace was originally built).
- Correcting this issue through a renovation to our current masonry chimney is challenging because any new (or heavily renovated) chimney must comply with modern codes for wood-burning fireplaces. After reviewing the modern codes, we have discovered that there are additional issues with our current fireplace that would also have to be addressed. These include the construction and dimension of the hearth, the presence of combustible material (wood) below the hearth, the extension of the flue tiles out of the chimney top, and others.
- We have designed a full-rebuild of the current fireplace into a **Rumford-style** fireplace with a rebuilt fire-clay lined chimney system.
- Multiple masons have confirmed that while this type of full-rebuild to our chimney is possible, it will be "very expensive". It may also require tearing down our existing chimney to the level of the first floor to rebuild, a prospect we are not overly excited about.
- None of the mason's we spoke to last spring had any ability to work on this project until after the current ski season (hence season number two of our candelabra), but we do have commitments from two that any work we decide to do can be done this summer, in advance of next season.
- The most common solution to our problem is to create a firebox which is manufactured to mate with a metal flue liner which goes up through the existing chimney. We are looking into options in this direction, as well as the full-rebuild.



To date the committee has talked to five chimney inspectors, six masons, three fireplace manufacturers, a few lawyers, an architect, and have had countless hours of debate. We can now faithfully report that we deeply understand the code issues with the current design and are exploring several paths forward. At the end of the day, we need to be proud of the final fireplace and expect it to burn well for the next 60+ years, just as our current fireplace has.

The committee will present multiple options to the board in the coming weeks and have a clear path forward by the end of this ski season. Stay tuned for more updates and please reach out to committee members with any questions or suggestions.

Norma M. Bartol, 93, longtime Greenwich, Connecticut resident and esteemed member of the ASCNY passed away peacefully on May 11, 2022.

Born in Brooklyn, New York on September 18, 1928, Norma had many interests and pursuits in her life. Norma was a long-time benefactor in her community on many philanthropic fronts - the Greenwich Riding & Trails Association, the Greenwich Historical Society, and the Northwest Greenwich Association. Norma's passion for skiing began on the slopes of Stowe, during a hiatus from Columbia University. While the dodge of "ski bum" has been an accepted (if not parentally tolerated) pursuit for generations, it was a rather mutinous and pioneering gesture for a young woman in the 1940's! After taking the Mt. Mansfield hill with cousins Shot & Willie Warner, Norma launched her journalism career as the social editor for the Mt. Mansfield Ski club publication.

Norma's zeal for skiing brought the family together. Her first husband David Walker was an active skier, and the couple spent many winter weekends at Stowe and then through John Gerli and others discovered Mad River Glen and joined the Amateur Ski Club. Norma adored the ski club and cherished the gathering of families with her four children. When she could no longer ski, Norma was the official bib collector during race events and enjoyed helping with the cocktails parties. In 2018, Norma was dignified by the club with the ASCNY Legacy Cup.

Norma is survived by Alex Walker, Hilary Hotchkiss, Lucia & Doug Walker and seven grandchildren who all ski MRG – and they can!



Jane Brown Nesbett passed away peacefully on September 7, 2024, at the age of 92 surrounded by her loving family.

Jane was a long-time member of the ASCNY. Some of her favorite family memories were at the lodge, and her passion for the club and Mad River Glen continues through her children and grandchildren. Community Spotlight: Lawson's Finest Liquids



The Fall Line was fortunate to catch up with Sean Lawson, founder of Lawson's Finest Liquids.

I read your history profile on the website. Obviously, you have commercial roots in the Valley. When you broke ground in 2017 for the new facility, were you resolute to maintain those roots in the Waitsfield area or did you consider other locations to build?

Building the home for Lawson's Finest Liquids in the Mad River Valley had been our plan from the beginning. This is our home community and we didn't consider anywhere else. Our desire is to make a lasting positive impact on the Mad River Valley with a contribution to both its economic and cultural vitality.

The landscape of the artisanal beer industry in New England has changed drastically in the past 10 – 15 years. The consumer has almost TOO many options these days, particularly choices brewed in the Green Mountain State. How do you continue to create product differentiation?

Our unique brand proposition is that we make the finest quality liquids AND we keep them the freshest. We are passionate about cold storage and supply chain that delivers our beer in brewery-fresh condition to our fans.

Speaking of consumers – I'm assuming beer palettes have matured since you brewed your first batch – how has the market changed in the two decades you've been in business?

Competition has changed drastically. There were 1,500 breweries in the U.S. when we began in early 2008. Today there are well over 9,000 breweries! In addition, the largest brewers and distributors have taken aggressive steps to shut small producers out of the market by controlling shelf space and access to the market. On a positive note, the number of world-class beers produced in the US has risen dramatically. It's a great time to be a craft beer drinker!

Without revealing too many proprietary cards, what does the future look like? Would you consider contract brewing as an opportunity? Partner possibilities with Sugarbush or Mad River Glen, like Magic Hat for example with Single Chair Ale. "Introducing "Stein's Run Stout" or "Rumble Rye IPA" and "Slide Brook Bourbon Lager"...hey, I should be working for you guys! :)

Actually, we're already doing all of these things. I've been brewing Sip of Sunshine IPA at Two Roads Brewing (TRB) in CT since 2014. It's been a great relationship (we are the licensed brewer and operate as an alternating premise). Like contract brewing, TRB produces the beer for us with our ingredients, recipe and process. We have great partnerships with Mad River Glen and Sugarbush, and we brew Still Single IPA for MRG and Castlerock IPA for SB. These are both "Good Brews for a Cause" and a portion of the proceeds go to designee.
